
# Some History

- In 2013 SAPTA wrote the Partnerships for Success (PFS) grant with a primary focus of prescription drug prevention. \$2,202,507 was awarded per year for five years. Mandated 85% be awarded to local communities.
- In January of 2014 a statewide Root-Cause Analysis meeting was hosted by SAPTA and existing data from state and community partners was gathered. A plan was developed to address:
  - "The prevalence of misuse/abuse of prescription drugs increased by 27% from 2002 to 2010."
- Funding began in February of 2014.

# Some History

- In September 2014 the National Governor's Association Policy Academy on Prescription Drug Prevention engaged Nevada in their efforts.
- SB459 was introduced during the 2015 legislation session and was approved by the Governor on May 5, 2015.
- In May of 2015 Nevada held two In-State Policy Workshops (Carson and Las Vegas) to engage key stakeholders in developing Nevada's plan.
- The plan was approved by the Governor in November of 2015.







## Nevada Is **Overmedicated** In 2012, healthcare providers wrote 259 million prescriptions of pain medications, which amounts to enough for every American adult to possess one bottle of pills. filled in 94 painkiller prescriptions were written per 100 people in Nevada in 2012. # Addiction and Diversion

Comprising 70% of misused prescription drugs, opioid pain relieves are the most commonly misused prescription drug.

- 2. 10% took them from a friend without asking





# Prescription Drug Abuse Prevention





One in four teens have abused prescription drugs in their lifetime and often get those drugs from unsuspecting family members, especially grandparents.





Many over-the-counter medications such as cough and cold medications pose health risks to children.

### Remember the Following:



- Take inventory of every medication you are taking.
- Count your medications so you know how many you have.
- Do not keep your medications "just in case" you may need them in the future.
- Clean out your medicine cabinet of unused prescription and over-the-counter medications.
- Don't leave your medications in plain sight.


## **Very Important**

### **How to Home Dispose of Prescription Drugs**

- 1. Put unused or expired solid medication in a sealable bag. (Include pet and liquid medications.)
- 2. Crush the pills with a can of food.
- 3. Add a small amount of water to help dissolve solid medications.
- Add kitty litter, or coffee grounds, to make medicine unattractive to children and animals.
- 5. Seal and gently mix the contents together.
- 6. Toss bag into trash.
- 7. Remove/destroy personal information on medicine containers.
- 8. Recycle medicine containers.








### Mental Health First Aid **Training** Be the Help Someone Needs

### What is Mental Health First Aid?

Mental Health First Aid is a public education program that introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental illnesses. This 8-hour course uses simulations to demonstrate how to offer initial help in a mental health crisis and connect persons to the appropriate professional, peer, social, and self-help care.

### Who Should Attend?

Everyone! If you have contact with the public, you should attend. This training is good for parents, families, educators, law enforcement, schools, medical staff, customer service providers, human resource professionals, faith communities, and caring citizens.

### Is this like CPR/First Aid?

Like CPR, Mental Health First Aid prepares participants to interact with a person in crisis and connect the person with help. First Aiders do not take on the role of professionals - they do not diagnose or provide any counseling or therapy.

### How Much Does It Cost?

# Mental Health First Aid Training

Mental Health First Aid is a public education program focused on training adults to respond and assist a person who is developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis.

### YOU WILL LEARN

- This course teaches participants the risk factors and warning signs of mental illnesses
- builds understanding of their impact, and overviews common supports systems

### · Participants do not learn to diagnose or how to provide therapy or counseling. COURSE DETAILS

Mental Health First Aid teaches participants a five-step action plan, ALGEE, to support someone developing signs and symptoms of a mental illness or in an emotional crisis

- Assess for risk of suicide or harm
- . Listen popiurlomentally
- Give reassurance and information
- Encourage appropriate professional help
- Encourage self-help and other support strategies

RAM is an international organization that travels the country and throughout the world providing free medical services with no qualifications. This event is for those in Northern Nevada who are uninsured or underinsured, with no eligibility requirements and no ID necessary. Medical services are provided on a first come, first served basis. Line-up starts at Midnight, numbers given out at 3 a.m., doors open at 6 a.m.



### DENTAL SERVICES

Poor dental health can affect a patient's overall health and result in serious medical problems. Essential Dental Services provided at RAM clinics include; cleanings, fillings, and extractions, and may include restorative procedures.

### VISION SERVICES

For many patients a pair of glasses may allow them to drive more safely, to keep or obtain a job, and/or to read a book for the first time in many years. Essential Vision Services provided at RAM clinics include: basic screenings, refracting, eye exams, and eye glasses for patients receiving a prescription.





### MEDICAL SERVICES

Essential Medical Services at a RAM clinic are dependent upon local resources and can include general medical consultations, diabetic screenings and education, mammograms\*, PAP smears, and other specialty services. PATIENTS MUST BRING LIST OF CURRENT MEDICATIONS! "Call 877-581-6266 to make an appointment to see if you qualify for a free or reduced-cost mammogram screening. Walk-in appointments also available at the RAM clinics.





# 2013 – 2015 Drug Cases (Possession and Trafficking & Sales)




